Just recently I was able to attend a conference on "Genetic Disorders and Pastoral Care." One of the speakers, Sister Delores Wilson, of the Archdiocese of Washington, developed her talk from a miracle story in John's Gospel, (5:1-9). She drew some interesting points from this Gospel passage that I would like to share with you.

The passage relates how Jesus came upon the pool called Bethzatha. The pool was surrounded by a large number of sick and disabled people. Ever so often, an angel came and stirred the waters and the first person in the waters was cured. Jesus came up to a person who had been in the pool area for thirty-eight years. Jesus asked him why he had been there for so long and the person answered because he had no one to carry him to the water.

He had no one to take him to the water. This is a very important statement for persons with disabilities and the Christian community. If we are to be community at all it should never have to be said by anyone that they have no one to take them to the water. It becomes terribly important that we as community assist each other. We can never ignore each other. We must be

community for each other.

But there is another side to this coin. Maybe the question has to be raised: why didn't anyone help this man in thirty-eight years? Is it possible that his man did not make himself lovable? Did he himself hold people back by his attitude? Were people afraid to help him because of the attack on their personalities this person might inflict on them? These are very important questions that we have to ask ourselves if we are to be community. We can never fill so sorry for ourselves and our situation that we prevent people from honestly reaching out to us.

So there are two sides to forming Christian Community, especially if we need special assists. One, we must make every effort to help each other and second, we must not put people off by our own poor attitudes.

Ofcourse the bottom line is always Jesus. He simply reached out and helped no matter what the situation was. This is what we all strive to do, but we certainly can make life easier on each other by being open to each others needs and also to accepting graciously the help of others in our need.

The Papal visit is fast approaching this town. Most of the details for our Holy Father's visit are in place. People who have requested tickets from this office have al-


ready been notified.

We will send the pass with the tickets. Maps and other information will accompany the ticket also.

If you can, come early, be patient and be prepared for the weather by wearing cool (but appropriate) clothing and hats. There will be first-aid stations, concession stands and

water stations set-up.



Community Information and Referral Services is providing a 24 hour statewide information and referral for health-impaired and physically disabled children and their families in serice areas such as medical, psycho/social, education, transportation, financial, advocacy and support. The new service was provided by a grant from the AZ Dept. of Health Services as mandated by Senate Bill 1312 signed into law by Governor Bruce Babbitt on May 2, 1986.

SPECIAL PERSON FOR SPECIAL PROGRAM

"Heraldos de Christo", Messengers of Christ, is a special program in Huascar, Peru. It's a combination of several scouting-type programs. It's coed and it includes handicapped children (mostly hearing and speech impaired). The program has camping, Bible studies, and similar learning experiences.

For such an exceptional program, Food for the Hungry found an exceptional volunteer, Pam Houston. Although limited by cerebral palsy since birth, Pam was able to complete the Hunger Corps field training and was accepted as a volunteer.

"This bold and courageous young woman proved an example to those of us with less limitations.," said Darrow Miller, hunger Corps director. "We hope and pray she will bring courage to others the world has labeled 'handicapped'. We also hope that her service will open the door a little wider for those Christians who, because of some impairment, have not been allowed to serve Christ overseas.

EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION - JTPA

The Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services of the U.S. Department of Education, and the Administration on Developmental Disabilities of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services are developing plans to increase employment of persons with disabilities and assist in the transition from school to work. The Job Tranining Partnership Act (JTPA) provides assistance to those with disabilities in local communities. The Carl Perkins Vocational Education Act earmarks 10% of state allocations for persons with handicaps.

Dear Father Bob,

My husband and I have a 36 year old daughter who is mentally retarded, cerebral palsied, epileptic and in need of total care. We are planning to turn our 3000 square foot home into a small group home to accommodate our daughter and 2 or 3 others with similar needs. Our problem is finding other parents having a daughter with the same needs as ours, who may wish to join us in establishing a perminent home for them which will continue after we are gone. It is our intention to provide excellent care now, and to incorporate safeguards so that the quality of care will still be provided after our death.

The purpose of joining with other parents is that costs will be shared and companionship provided; plus if one set of parents passes away the others will see that care is continued

for all.

I have employed licensed practical nurses for the past 10 years to help me care for my daughter, but now feel the time has come for perminent 24 hour care.

I would greatly appreciate it if you could put me in touch with other parents with needs

similar to mine.
