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



PARENT'S RIGHTS



The following parent's rights were taken from REACH OUT AND TEACH' a parent handbook distributed by the American Foundation for the Blind. Although written for parents with young blind children, these guidelines speak to ALL parents. They help us to maintain a healthy perspective, especially when working with professionals such as our child's teacher(s) or doctor(s).

- 1. THE RIGHT TO FEEL ANGRY Nothing in life prepares anyone for being handicapped, and when it is your child who is handicapped, it seems all the more unfair. Be angry, but use you anger to get the best services you can for your child.
- 2. THE RIGHT TO SEEK ANOTHER OPINION

 Everyone is told today that it makes good sense to seek a second opinion before having surgery, or before investing money, or before buying a used car. It should not be any different for you and your handicapped child whether you are looking for medical care or an educational program.
- 3. THE RIGHT TO PRIVACY
 Some aspects of your life are simply no one else's business. If you do
 not want to discuss something, or if you do not want your child's picture
 taken, it is your right to say "No".
- 4. THE RIGHT TO KEEP TRYING

 Parenting is not easy, but all parents try to do the best job they can.

 It sometimes becomes harder when well-meaning friends and professionals tell you that you have set goals that your child will never be able to reach. There is nothing wrong with you if you are not willing to give up.
- 5. THE RIGHT TO STOP TRYING
 Well-meaning friends and professionals have also told parents that they
 do not work often enough or long enough with their handicapped children.
 YOU are the one who lives with your child; YOU are the one who is being
 asked to do one MORE thing; YOU are the one who is somehow expected to
 accomplish at home what trained teachers have not been able to do at
 school. If you just cannot do it tonight okay. That is your decision.
- 6. THE RIGHT TO SET LIMITS

 There are limits to what one person can do; you shouldn't expect yourself to think about your child all the time. And your child shouldn't expect to be the center of attention. You are not SUPER-PARENT.
- 7. THE RIGHT TO BE A PARENT
 You and your child need time to fool around, giggle, tell stories, laugh, and just do nothing. Those times are just as much a part of your child's education as the time you spend following the activities in any book.
- 8. THE RIGHT TO BE UNENTHUSIASTIC

 Sometimes you feel sad, or you're worried about money or your child, or you feel sick. If other people take that as a sign that you're "not adjusting" or that you're "not accepting your child's handicap" that is their problem. You have a right to be "up" sometimes and "down" others.

SIBLING EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The Siblings Exchange Program is a support program for brothers and sisters of children with handicaps and is sponsored jointly by the Phoenix Children's Hospital Child Development Center and Pilot Parents. Siblings react in a variety of ways to their individual situations. The program consists of 13 weekly sessions running for 1½hours a week. Children's Lekotek of Phoenix, a joint venture of Hacienda de Los Angeles, Inc. and Southwest Human Development, is a worldwide sydtem of support for families with children who have handicaps or special needs. Lekotek focuses on the family unit, seeking to strengthen that relationship. Rather than "working" with a child, or "teaching", the Lekotek Leader "plays" with the child and parents and, through play, emonstrates the abilities of the child. Pilgrims Progress

Where has the year gone! This office structure operates from fiscal year to fiscal year - July to June. Already work has begun for next year's programs. We have had three new programs this last year- Faith in Action, Faith and Light. and a Parents Support Group. By the response we received, they were well received and much needed. They came about through the direction of Fr. Bob who saw the need.

Faith and Light is a community movement of people wounded in varying degrees by a mental handicap. These communities are not residential, but rather communities whose members meet at regular intervals.

Faith in Action is for persons with physical disabilities who meet on a regular basis for spiritual and social enrichment.

The Parent Support Group is for parents of mentally handicapped children.

We have given over 40 performances of KIDS ON THE BLOCK this last school year. Not all of them have been to schools. The farthest we went was to Flagstaff for a State Blind Convention of Educators. We had many requests from schools outside of Maricopa County. As much as we like to bring this program to the schools, we were unable to reach these children, due mostly to the unavailability of our volunteers being able to travel at great distances. Also it was difficult to finance any trips over 40 miles. Hopefully, next year we can see some changes in this aspect of the

Many people will be taking long trips this summer. We do have ACCESS TRAVEL: AIRPORTS, a guide to accessibility of terminals. Just call and we will send you a booklet. Hopefully you will enjoy a 'cool' and safe summer.
