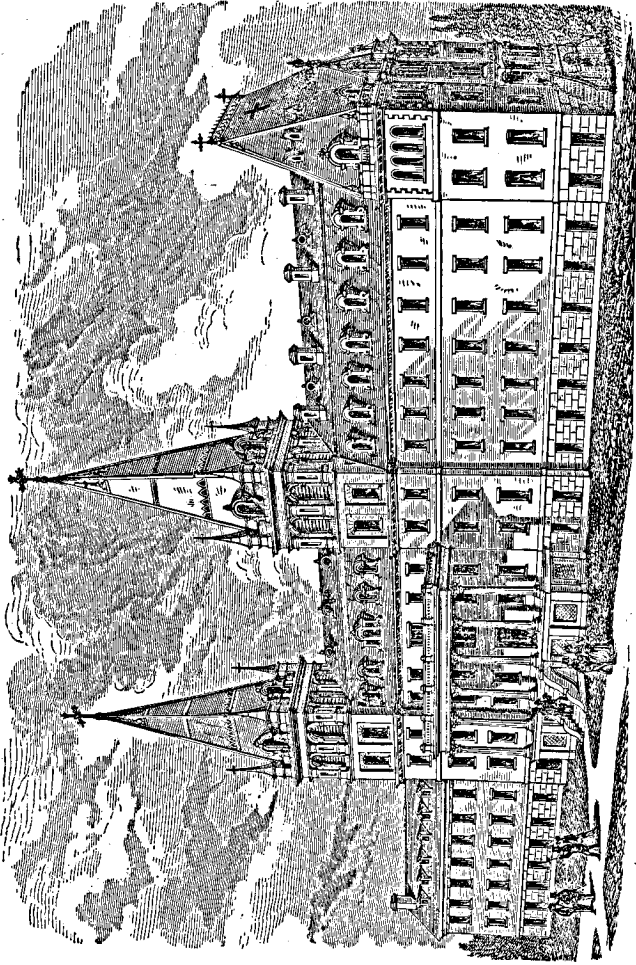
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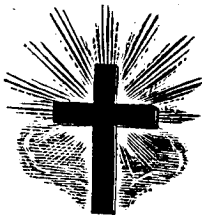

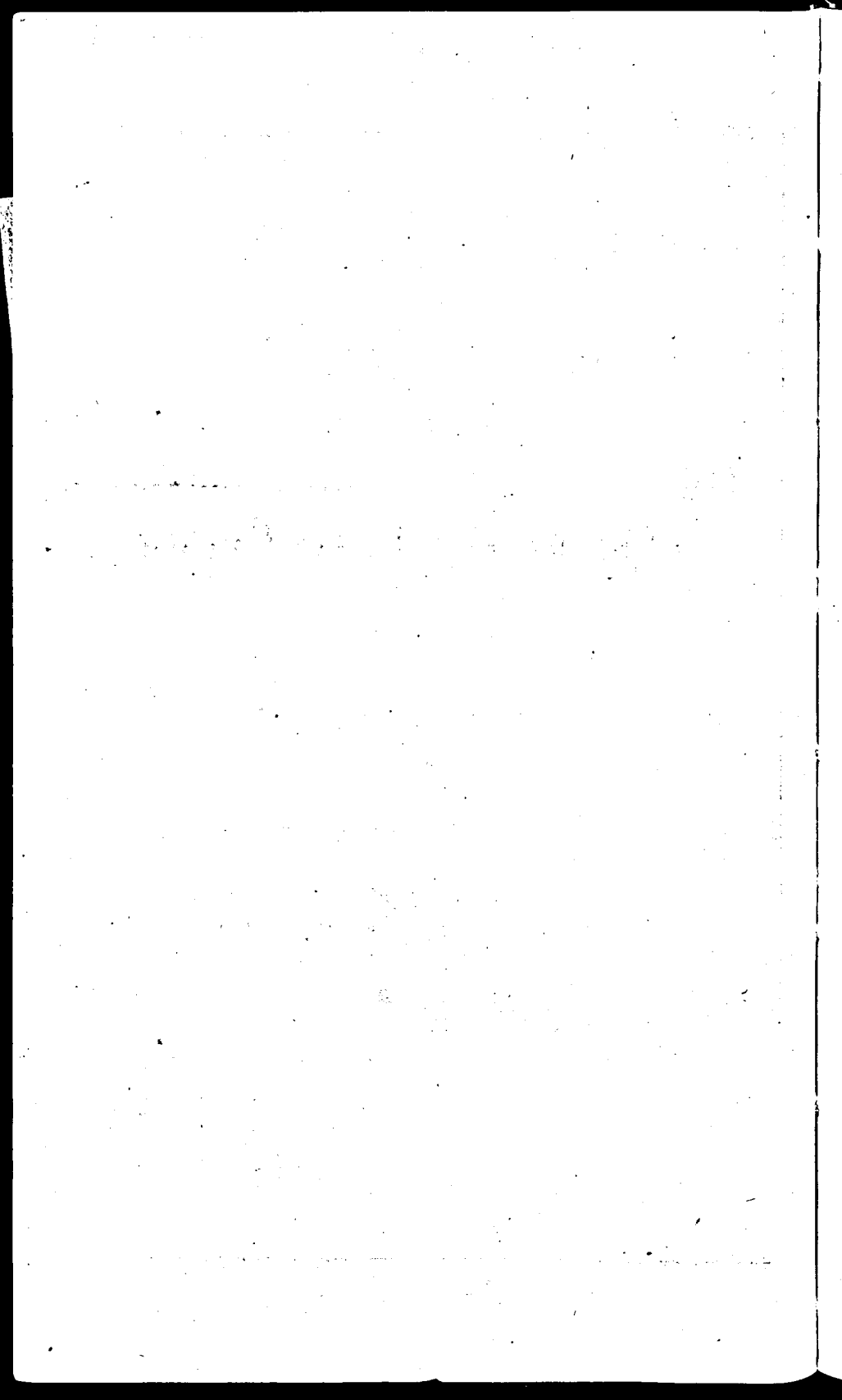

Preparatory Department.

The object of the Preparatory Department is to give to the student the advantage of pursuing, at the Institution, that course of studies which may the sooner and better qualify him for entrance upon the Collegiate Course.

The length of time embraced by these preparatory studies is proportioned to the proficiency of the student at the date of entrance, and to subsequent progress.

The conditions of admission are, that the applicant be moderately versed in the fundamental principles of Grammar and Arithmetic.

Collegiate Department.

The Lectures in Mental Philosophy are delivered in the Latin Lan-
 guage, and the disputations of the class, both public and private, are
 held in that language.

EXAMINATIONS.

The *Regular Examination* for the admission of candidates is commenced during the last week of August, but applicants are received at any time during the year. Early presentation, however, is strongly advised. Every candidate is examined by the Prefect of Schools, and assigned to his grade in the Preparatory or Collegiate Department, according to his attainments.

The *Middle Examination* occurs at the end of the 1st Term, about the last week of January. Students are held accountable for the matter read during that term. At the conclusion of the examination the standing of each is publicly announced. A report of the examination, together with the grade occupied by each student during the term, is sent to Parents and Guardians.

At this examination, promotions, if deserved, are made in the Preparatory Department, and such promotions are equivalent to the honors of the class left.

The *Final Examination* is held at the conclusion of the 2d Term, and embraces all the matter of that term. Parents and Guardians, by means of printed reports, are made acquainted with the position held by their sons or wards at this examination and during the previous term.

DEGREES.

The candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts must undergo a rigorous examination in Moral and Natural Philosophy, Astronomy and Chemistry, and must be well acquainted with the following branches, to wit: Latin, Greek, French and Mathematics. He is also required to write a speech or essay on a Literary, Scientific, or Moral Subject, a copy of which must be left at the College. If he remain longer in College, and pursue the higher branches of Moral and Natural Philosophy, or if he graduate in any learned profession, after completing the above course of collegiate studies, he may receive the degree of Master of Arts.

PRACTICE OF COMPOSITION AND DECLAMATION.

Every student in the Collegiate Department must write an English Composition or Essay, every week, on a subject assigned by the Professor.

Exercise in Elocution is had by each class every week, and at different times during the year Declamation is had publicly in the hall, before the Faculty and Professors of the College.

COLLEGE PRIZES.

Two Prizes in each class of both Departments are awarded to successful competitors.

One Prize in each class is awarded for English Composition.

An Extraordinary Prize is given in each Department for the best English Composition.

Two Prizes are in like manner awarded in Elocution.

Two Prizes are awarded in the two classes of Christian Doctrine, and two also are awarded by the vote of the students for gentlemanly deportment and exact observance of College regulations.

LIBRARIES.

The College Library contains 8,000 volumes.

The B. J. F. Library numbers 650 volumes, and is constantly increasing from the fund of the B. J. F. Society.

It is opened for the members two evenings of every week.

The Senior and Junior Libraries contain a judicious selection of appropriate works, and are opened at convenient times.

SPECIAL REMARKS.

Testimonials as to good moral character and of honorable dismissal are required from applicants from other institutions. Careful attention is bestowed on the religious and moral training of the students who, even in the hours of recreation, are under the care of officers of the College.

Every student is required to attend regularly to his religious duties.

Books, papers, periodicals, etc., are not allowed circulation in the College without having been previously revised by one of the Faculty.

The use of tobacco is prohibited to the students, and no one will be admitted who is unwilling to abide by the prohibition.

Whilst the moral and intellectual culture of the youth committed to our care is attended to with all assiduity, their physical development is by no means neglected. A Ball Alley and Gymnasium occupy a portion of the ordinary play grounds; and every opportunity is afforded for innocent and healthy exercise.

All charges must be paid *half-yearly in advance*. Should any defer paying them for the space of *one month* from the commencement of the term, the President of the College is *directed to remove* their sons or wards from the Institution. Should any pupil be removed by his parents or guardians, or *should he withdraw himself from the College*, before the term expires, no deduction will be made.

No expenditure for clothing, nor advances for pocket money, will be made by the Institution, unless an equivalent sum be deposited with the President, or with the Treasurer of the College. The books and stationery necessary for the different classes, may be procured at the College.

Each student must be supplied with, at least, two suits for daily wear, and one for Sundays; six shirts, six pairs of stockings, six pocket-handkerchiefs, six towels, two or three cravats, etc.; two or three pairs of boots or shoes, and an overcoat or cloak. Each student must be provided with a silver table spoon, marked with his name.

B. J. F. SOCIETY.

This Society was organized in the year 1849, and is named "the B. J. F. Society," in reverence and gratitude to the Right Reverend BENEDICT JOSEPH FENWICK, the Founder of the College of the Holy Cross. It is a Debating Society, having for its object the advancement of knowledge and the cultivation of eloquence. It consists of resident, non-resident and honorary members. The resident members hold their meetings weekly.
