CHICAGO REUNION REPORT

The Chicago Reunion Committee continues to make plans for the reunion. Decisions have been made on the Memorial Service and Parade, the entertainment for Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

Memorial

The Memorial Service will be held on Saturday morning at the memorial Eternal Flame on the Plaza of the Richard J. Daley Center. The parade will be approximately a mile long, forming at the plaza of the Hyatt Regency Chicago Hotel, proceeding along Wacker Drive, Clark Street, and Washington Boulevard to the Eternal Flame.

Besides the Eternal Flame the Plaza has the world famous steel sculpture by Picasso. It was created by the renowned artist on special commission of the Fine Arts Association of Chicago.

The entertainment will follow the usual pattern of our reunions.

Welcoming Party

Thursday night will be a welcoming party with beer, pretzels, and music from a cordovox. The program for this night is designed to permit the "Old Reliables" to renew acquaintances and catch up on their friends' activities since the last reunion.

Grand Ballroom

Friday night will be a dance with music by the Ralph Berger Orchestra. This orchestra knows how to play the type of music the Ninth Division members enjoy. The dance will be in the Regency Ballroom, the Hotel's grand ballroom.

Banquet

The traditional banquet will be held Saturday night for the presentation of awards, announcements, etc. Following the banquet will be a dance with Tom Fitzsimmons' band.

The entertainment should provide plenty of fun for everyone.

For those members coming in early or staying after the Reunion the hotel has agreed to grant the convention rates for room rentals.

Registration

Registration will start at 9:00 AM on Thursday July 28, 1977. The registration area will be announced in the next issue of the Octofoil.

At their meetings between now and the reunion the committees will continue to develop their plans for the various activities. The Concurrent Activities Committee will have all kinds of information on what to see and do outside the hotel during the Reunion. Everyone should have a good time in Chicago, the City that works.

Dear Dan:

Please accept enclosed dues long overdue.

Last October, Mrs. Herman and I went over on the QE II and landed at Cherbourg. We drove up to Octeville where I was hit, and instead of the farm house, there is a huge condominium!

Then we drove up to Fort du Rhoule, which you will recall was the place where the German High Command made its last stand and General Von Schlieban was captured by leading elements of the 39th.

We also visited the beaches at Utah and toured the Normandy Peninsula.

It was a most memorable trip. But one thing should be corrected, Dan. At Fort du Rhoule, the City of Cherbourg has converted the Fort into a museum which is most interesting. Unfortunately, however, there is no mention of any kind of the 9th in the museum although the flags of all the other divisions, such as the 4th, are hanging in memory. In the historical accounts, there is no mention of the 9th or any of its units.

I do not need to tell you that this is wrong and should be corrected. Since the museum is under the auspices of the City of Cherbourg's Historical Society, I would suggest two things: First, you write them of this omission, and, second, we start a fund to send them a 9th Division Flag to hang in the museum with all the others. Also, we should collect and forward such things as the Divisional Patch and the history of the 9th for the museum, which I am sure they would accept.

Please let me know what I can do to help.

With all I went through after getting captured in the battle of El Guettar Tunisia, North Africa and 26 months a Kriessg long ner (P.O.W.) with Der Fuhrer and no heat in the barracks and northern Germany and so little food, rudobaker soup and 1-10 of a loaf of black bread and ersotz (imitation) tea and thanks to the Red Cross (survived) now a little draft in the apartment sometimes all day without heat I catch a cold or flu very easy.

Sister Alice who is in charge of the Senior Center that I go to at the Immaculate Conception school has been to see me twice in a few days and is coming in the morning and we go to the doctor. What makes it worse, I am single and alone as my two sisters passed away. My brother lives in Sarasota, Florida so eventually I will go there. I survived Germany with no heat in the barracks and straw for a bed and two thin very small blankets. I guess they grabbed from some dead soldiers, the French or whatever all the different countries Hitler was fighting.

I hear from a fellow Merton Leroy Call (former 9th man) who is in Eastport, Maine and I think he belongs to the Association, in fact I think that is how he got my name. I don't remember him with my company and or when we were captured because I wasn't too long with E. Co. as I originally was with I Co. before I went to O.C.S. and didn't make it so I was sent back to E Co. where they were in the company street going to Maryland for maneuvers (Solomon Islands and then for the invasion of North Africa."
