My dear Jennie:

I and Moody ~~and~~
I had to-day. The ruffians who
have so long and maliciously
persecuted me are about to
succeed in bringing their false-
hoods to an investigation. It
is not the dread of being tried
for these offences (if I am con-
-victed of which I ought
to be shot) but the thought
of losing my own countrymen
seek to my life or at least
my disgrace forever, that
makes me sad to day. I shall
be busy with my defence for
some time; and while these
accusations are on trial

before a Court Martial
I shall be busy and if you
should miss my letter it
is on account of my hatred
against the most baseless
envy and ignorant ~~malice~~
malice that ever sought the
ruin of any man. Ah!

glorious, how deeply it affects
me to think that the Country
I loved from my inmost
heart should produce such
~~base~~ ^{those} vipers as these fellows
are! but so it is. I am for
the first time in my life
disappointed.

My little Watch
is safe. I wear it. We are
to move away from here
I know not where ^{we are} ~~we are~~
going to.
