## Letter to Jennie Guiney, 1863 September 20

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Bulwer's Ba. Sept 20. 1863

My dear Jennie

Yesterday I sent to your address

good of me but we had several taken  
none of which would suit the doctor  
so in order to please him I threw  
myself into an awkward position  
and thereby made him as handsome  
as nature. He looks as if he meant  
to have a good picture taken - don't he?



The one in which Flyn - I send  
because it is decidedly the best picture  
of Harry.

There is no sign of a fight  
here - probably will be none unless  
~~attacks~~ attacks us.

Plunkett has not arrived  
yet. The weather is quite cold  
especially at night. Flyn  
will no doubt be going off in  
a day or two. I do not know  
whether he intends to go home  
or to stay in Washington. I think  
he is in consumption and advised  
him to go into the "Invalid Corps"  
but he thinks he can get well and  
will not go into that corps. Do  
not forget what I told you in rela-  
tion to him - I have the best of reasons  
for the view I take of that matter.

There Rev. Mr. Egan of Wash-  
ington is now our Chaplain. He  
is a very good man - a Dominican  
Friar and a hippy man.
